## HIV/AIDS in the first quarter of the millennium

FORTY and 22 new HIV and AIDS cases were reported respectively to the Department of Health in the quarter of January to March 2000. The cumulative total now stood at 1399 for HIV cases, and 455 of them were known to have progressed to AIDS. Male is still the predominantly affected gender whilst the narrowing of the male-to-female ratio for the newly reported cases continued. Chinese accounted for more than 70% of the cases.

Although sexual transmission remained the most frequent route of HIV transmission, one notable point was that we had another new case due to injecting drug use (IDU) in this quarter. Six cases relating to IDU were reported in the year of 1999. Albeit that the cumulative IDU infections was only 24, the trend of identifying new cases in the last four consecutive quarters appeared consistent and persistent. This is worrying as HIV infections in the drug-taking population can notoriously explode within a short period of time. The prime objective of the AIDS programme is to prevent infections and a warning bell genuinely rang.

Preventive education and risk reduction is a must. The question is how the efforts can be expanded to reach more drug users effectively. Messages are obvious. If the drug users cannot quit drug injection, the bottomline is that no needle-sharing should be practised. Better still, he/she has to use a new needle every time he/she injects. This applies to them while in Hong Kong or when they travel outside Hong Kong. All drug and treatment services, including those run by the government and non-governmental organisations, shall be mobilised to act. Another key strategy is to encourage HIV testing for the drug users. Not only will this enhance the understanding of situation in the community, early diagnosis of the infected can facilitate care and management for his/her health. ♂

## **Second surveillance workshop for the Pearl River Delta**

**THE** second workshop on HIV surveillance and epidemiology in the Pearl River Delta Region will be held on 9th and 10th June, 2000 at the Lam Woo International Conference Centre. The first workshop was held in Macau in December 1998; the popularity of which prompted people of the Region to organise a second workshop.

The objectives of holding this coming workshop are: (a) to enhance the understanding of the epidemiology and mechanisms of surveillance of HIV/AIDS and related risk factors in the region, (b) to facilitate information exchanges for strengthening activities relating to the surveillance and control of HIV/AIDS, and (c) to develop and explore means of collaboration among professionals working on HIV/AIDS surveillance.

The programme will consist of plenary lectures, roundtable discussions, site visits and rapporteur session. Preliminarily, the topics to be covered include global HIV epidemiology, modelling of HIV infection, behavioural surveillance, HIV situation in cities of the Pearl River Delta Region, and HIV/AIDS management. The workshop has been accredited by the Hong Kong College of Community Medicine as an CME activity - for a maximum of six points. 
technical organisations.
