THE **Youth Action on AIDS** Funding Scheme 2002 concluded with a Prize Presentation Ceremony on 22 February at the Red Ribbon Centre. The function was officiated by Mrs Carrie Yau, Permanent Secretary for Health, Welfare and Food of the HKSAR Government.

The Scheme has been one of the most popular projects spearheaded by the Advisory Councilon AIDS through a Task Force of Youth of the previous Committee on Education and Publicity on AIDS (CEPAIDS). Each year youth groups were sponsored to undertake projects to promote AIDS awareness in young people, and to foster a positive attitude towards people living with HIV/AIDS. In 2002, 13 projects were supported under the Scheme.

Honorary Degree on Distinguished Person

Rev. Father. Alfred J. Deignan, SJ will receive the degree of Doctor of Social Sciences honoris causa at the 166th Congregation of the University of Hong Kong on 20 March 2003, for his enormous contributions to education in Hong Kong and Asia.

Father Deignan is no stranger to us working on AIDS in Hong Kong. He was a member of the Advisory Council on AIDS from 1990 to 1996. In 1994, the Department of Health appointed an *Expert Panel on HIV of Health Care Workers* to provide advice to attending physicians of HIV infected health care workers, a task recommended in the Council's Guidelines formulated in 1994. Father Deignan is the chairman of the Panel and has been actively involved insolving complex issues relating to HIV infection in health care workers for almost a decade. **\$**

MEMBERS interested in tracking the HIV situation in Hong Kong may wish to note that effective from the beginning of the year, quarterly statistics derived from the HIV/AIDS reporting system would be published in e-version only. The Special Preventive Programme of the Department of Health informed that the new quarterly report has been considerably expanded and can be downloaded from the Virtual AIDS Office www.aids.gov.hk. The first report covered the situation as of the end of the third quarter of the year 2002. It's a 46-page e-report with figures and analysis on distribution in age, gender, ethnicity and exposure categories.

A brand new annual HIV report is being published, which would be released in both hard copy and e-version. 8

CPA meeting

THE Committee on Promoting Acceptance of People living with HIV/ AIDS (CPA) met on 25 February 2003 for the first time in the new term of office of the Advisory Council on AIDS (2002-2005).

The terms of reference of the new Committee are, to: (a) recommend measures conducive to promoting acceptance of people living with HIV/AIDS; (b) explore legal and ethical issues of HIV/AIDS and their implications on societal acceptance; and (c) examine and recommend responses to incidents relating to the acceptance of people living with HIV/AIDS.

Apart from studying and proposing to fine-tune the schema of operation, Members discussed about means of translating objectives into action through strategy development, best practice identification, and the recommendation on possible evaluation and research. The Meeting examined a survey report presented by the Hong Kong Council of Social Service, which studied the awareness, attitude and behaviours of social welfare personnel. The Secretariat also prepared notes for discussing on a TV programme (AIDSFILE) recently screened by RTHK.

Members of the new term are drawn from agencies working on AIDS care, academics, professionals, and people reflecting the interest and rights of HIV/AIDS patients in Hong Kong. \$

THE Lions Red Ribbon Fellowship

Scheme for the year 2003 is

now open for application. The Scheme is a collaborative project between Red Ribbon Centre and Lions Clubs International District 303 Hong Kong and Macao.

The Fellowship scheme is designed forprofessionals working on HIV/AIDS in Mainland China, to enable them to further their professional development through the execution of proposed activities, including visits and research. By the end of the year 2002, 15 fellows have been sponsored to Hong Kong for periods ranging from two to four weeks.

REFLECTIONS ON THE 10TH CROI FEBRUARY 10-14, 2003, BOSTON, USA

Dr KH Wong of Special Preventive Programme, Department of Health, contributed this article on his participation in one of the most important scientific conferences on AIDS this year.

THE 10th Conference on Retrovirus and Opportunistic Infections(CROI), the leadingscientific meeting on HIV, was held in Boston, USA in February 2003. It was an important occasion for bringing together scientists, clinicians, and researchers to share research experience and deliberate on issues of interest and importance.

Dr. David Ho, Chair of the CROI, expressed that the purpose of this Meeting wasto provide a forum for translating laboratory and clinical research into real life medical applications. The 5-day Meeting featuredan openingsession, 7 plenary lectures, 10 symposia, 184 oral abstractsand 745 poster presentations (http://www.retroconference.org/ 2003/).Technical though, the Meeting also had a clear emphasis on the community and international dimensions of HIV epidemic.

Addressing the prevention and care needs of the developing world Sub-Saharan Africa has continued to be the continent bearing the brunt of HIV, with 3.5 million new infections in 2002. New HIV epidemics in Eastern Europe has also been spreading rampantly. More so, treatment remained negligibly accessible in these countries. On the other hand, the provision of treatment in resource-poor setting with good outcome was demonstrated to be feasible in a US-assisted project in rural Haiti, with the approach of directly observed therapy. It is high time to re-match the intervention tool of treatment to places most in need of it, as issues such as infra-structural health support are really not unsolvable.

Getting the money and system

To provide a broader perspective for tacklingthe pandemic in the real world, and a tinge of taste on funding, politics and system, Mr. William Jefferson Clinton, the 42nd President of the



United States, stressed time and again in his Keynote speech on the importanceof integrating prevention, care and treatment of HIV/AIDS, and the need of a system in place to carry things forward. He also alleged that evidence should overcome ideologyandscienceshouldovercome politics in the AIDS response. Furthermore, there was introduction of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation in one plenary talk. The availability of more resources for HIV/AIDS response is undoubtedly necessary and desirable; the question remains how the utilisation of various funds could bebetter coordinated and interfaced.

Advancing scientific frontiers The Meeting was indeed a good opportunity to review and present the latest basic and clinical scientific advances in HIV. Cutting across different fields, such as virology, immunology, clinical manifestations, antiretroviral treatment, vaccine development, clinical pharmacology and HIV diagnostics, most presentations are interesting and informative. There were many highlights, including that on HIV evolution and resistance, vif protein, RNAi,immunopathogenesis,immune control of HIV, vaccines, HIV entry inhibitor, hepatitisviruses coinfection, clinical trials, cohorts, maternal-tochild transmission, and treatment interruption.

Reconciling for Hong Kong

The response to AIDS in Hong Kong has its uniqueness. In the face of the scientific advances, the changing internaland external environments of Hong Kong would also impact on the future path of AIDS programme. Sustaining the prevention-care continuum, breaking the localice bergs of basic and clinical science, interfacing with Mainland's development of prevention and treatment programmes are just some of the whole lot of questions. **X**
