## Closer Tie with National Programme


**Dr** Homer Tso, accompanied by Dr SS Lee, attended a meeting in Beijing to exchange views on HIV prevention, surveillance and treatment on 15 March 2005. The meeting was hosted by professional staff of National Centre for STD/AIDS Prevention and Control of China CDC. He was presented with a Certificate of Appointment as Honorary Professor of the Centre by its, Director, Dr Shen Jie. Dr Shen jie is an honorary adviser to the Scientific Committee of the Hong Kong Advisory Council on AIDS.

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# Chairman returned home and told his story about AIDS



**Dr.** Homer TSO, the Chairman of the Hong Kong Advisory Council on AIDS, delivered a lecture on "AIDS in Hong Kong for 20 years – a dental perspective" at the Hong Kong Dental Association (HKDA) on 22 February 2005. Dr. Tso said that this was the time to go back home – HKDA. He was the chairman of HKDA in 1992.

In the 2-hour lecture, Dr. Tso told the story of Dr. Mike Sinclair and the response of HKDA at that time to illustrate the link between dental professional and HIV. This story also revealed the importance of infection control in clinical settings. He re-introduced "HIV Infection and the Health Care Worker - Recommended"

Guidelines", which was first published in 1994 by the ACA. He stressed that all principles were still valid at the present time.

**Dr.** Tso also introduced the advance in HIV management. He explained the impact of highly active anti-retroviral therapy on the disease progression and the prognosis. The latest situation of HIV epidemiology in Hong Kong was mentioned. Dr. Tso pointed out that sexual contact was the commonest route of transmission in Hong Kong. He also introduced the work of the ACA and quoted universal antenatal HIV screening programme as an accomplishment.

**Finally,** Dr. Tso briefly talked about the HIV epidemic in mainland China and his visit to Henan in January 2005. The participants spent an evening in return for an informative and entertaining lecture.

### **Committees Meetings**

The Scientific Committee on AIDS (SCA) held its 35<sup>th</sup> meeting on 15 March 2005. There were three main items on the agenda.

- (A) On the report of a pilot study of using OraQuick HIV - 1/2 rapid test in AIDS Counselling and Testing Service, members were given to know the results of a pilot study examining the feasibility and client satisfaction of applying OraQuick HIV 1/2 rapid test from February to May 2004. 320 subjects were recruited to participate in the study. It was noted that there was full concordance between results of rapid tests and corresponding conventional tests.
- **(B)** Regarding the recommendations from the US Department of Health and Human Services for antiretroviral postexposure prophylaxis after injection-drug use, sexual, nonoccupational exposure to HIV in the United States, members generally agreed that a 28-day course of highly active antiretroviral therapy (HAART) to be recommended for persons seeking care < 72 hours after nonoccupational exposure to blood, genital secretions, or other potentially infectious body fluids of a person known to be HIV infected, when that exposure represented a substantial risk for transmission. It

was agreed that more information would be required before making a recommendation for Hong Kong with a low HIV seroprevalence.

(C) As regards the paper entitled "Twenty years of clinical HIV/AIDS in Hong Kong", members noted the paper which followed the previous discussions on setting a research agenda on HIV/AIDS for Hong Kong and attempted to review the published findings pertaining to clinical HIV/AIDS in Hong Kong in the last 20 years. They also looked at the key local developments on clinical care and research since the first diagnosis of HIV/AIDS in Hong Kong in 1984.

#### **\* \* \*** The AIDS Prevention and Care

Committee (APCC) met on 18 March 2005 at its 19<sup>th</sup> meeting. The focus of the meeting was on ethnic minorities in Hong Kong. A representative of the Home Affairs Bureau briefed members on the distinctive features of main ethnic minorities in Hong Kong. Representatives of two NGOs also presented to members the results of their recent surveys on HIV situation of ethnic minorities in Hong Kong and their awareness of HIV/AIDS. As the HA Standard Drug Formulary was giving serious cause for concern, the meeting agreed to report members' concern to the ACA for its follow-up action. \*\*
