
### 56<sup>th</sup> ACA Meeting

## The third 1000 HIV case reported in Hong Kong

Hong Kong has recorded the third-thousand human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) case recently since the first local HIV infection was reported in 1984. While the HIV epidemic in Hong Kong has taken 13 and 5 years to rise to the first and second thousand cumulative cases, it took less than 4 years to hit the third 1000 mark. On the quarterly scale, we recorded 90 new HIV reports in the second quarter (Apr to Jun) of 2006. It is the third consecutive quarter that the quarterly HIV number is greater than 85. The HIV incidence seems to be increasing at a greater rate.

Analysis of the cases reported in the second quarter of 2006 through the voluntary case-based notification system supported by clinicians and laboratories yielded the following observations. Males accounted for 80% of cases, all age over 13 years-old, mostly in the age range of 30 to 39 years-old (37.8%). 53.3% have contracted the infection through sexual contact, 14.4% through injecting drug use, and the remaining had the mode of transmission undetermined. Further analysis showed that men who have sex with men (MSM), i.e. homosexual and bisexual men, have been more often quoted as the mode of transmission as compared to men who have only had heterosexual contact. For the second guarter of 2006, 28.9% of all HIV infection was MSM, as compared with 24.4% of heterosexuals. This rising trend in MSM infections has been observed since early 2005. The ratio of heterosexual man to MSM has decreased gradually from 1.1 in 2004, to 0.7 in 2005, and 0.6 for the first 6 months of 2006.

Since late 2005, we have requested the reporting physician to determine whether the patients have contracted the infection locally or from a place outside of Hong Kong. For the 179 cases reported in the first six months of 2006, 33% were reported to have acquired HIV in Hong Kong, 24% contracted the virus elsewhere, and 16% reported undetermined location. Such information is not available for the remaining 27% of cases. For those who contracted the virus outside of Hong Kong, 16 quoted Mainland China as the place of infection, 23 reported other Asian areas and the remaining five have been to American or African countries. Hong Kong recorded 3000 cumulative reported HIV cases this quarter and the epidemic has become notably more furious. Sexual transmission remains the commonest route of HIV infection. The number of MSM cases persisted at high levels in recent quarters. People were found to have become HIV-infected both in Hong Kong and in other places. However, incomplete and under reporting may have compromised the quality of data and the analysis. Doctors are encouraged to report HIV infections using standard form DH2293, which can be downloaded at http://www.aids.gov.hk/report.htm.
