A Summary of the 108th ACA Meeting held on 11 October 2019

Co-infection of viral hepatitis in people living with HIV (PLHIV)

DH introduced the situation of co-infection of hepatitis A, hepatitis B and hepatitis C among people living with HIV in Hong Kong (PLHIV). Current prevention and control strategies against viral hepatitis among PLHIV and the proposed way forward were also presented.

Members noted that screening and education were important domains in the overall prevention and control strategies and suggested NGOs to organise programmes to promote testing and to raise the awareness on viral hepatitis co-infection among target populations.

The Council will keep in view the epidemiology of co-infections of viral hepatitis among PLHIV and encourage raising awareness of the shared route of transmission among target populations via different platforms. Since the risk of re-infection with sexually acquired viral hepatitis was significant, strategies of secondary prevention such as counselling and support services for PLHIV should also be reviewed and strengthened in the HIV clinics.

Report of the Community Forum on AIDS

Members noted the summary report and discussions of the 52nd CFA Meeting held on 9 September 2019. A summary of this CFA Meeting was contained in the ACA Newsfile (Vol. 26, No. 11 – November 2019).

Feasibility of using web-based ordering and result upload to support HIV selftesting among men who have sex with men (MSM) in Hong Kong

DH presented the progress of an HIV self-testing study targeting MSM by the Special Preventive Programme of DH. The self-testing study was commenced in late September 2019. DH also briefed members on how the study would be conducted, from online ordering of self-test kits to result upload and feedback, linkage to support and care for those tested positive as well as the promotional materials.


Members noted that the confirmation tests for those tested positive could be arranged by the AIDS Counselling and Testing Service (ACTS) of DH and the 3 NGOs. To ensure personal data security, the relevant clauses on protecting participants' confidentiality were included in the online consent form. From the experience of similar studies in Taiwan, Guangdong and the project by AIDS Concern, DH estimated that an adequate number of post-testing questionnaires would be received from the target 1,500 participants.

Highlights of the 10th IAS Conference on HIV Science, Mexico City, Mexico

DH presented the latest development of various aspects in the field of HIV, as presented in the 10th IAS Conference on HIV Science held in Mexico City in July 2019. Topics covered included pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP), self-testing and HIV prevention for transgenders.


Members noted the World Health Organization's updated recommendations on the use of event driven PrEP and they opined that more education about the practical use of daily or event driven PrEP could be provided by NGOs. Hong Kong could also make reference from overseas experiences of using social media such as mobile phone apps to approach target groups. It was anticipated that the local PrEP implementation studies could provide more information and suggest possible ways forward.
