Workshop with CAN

A one-week workshop will be held in the first week of March on AIDS counselling and education for some delegates from China. Organised by CHINA AIDS NETWORK (CAN) and the Department of Health's AIDS Unit, the programme aims at achieving better coordination of workers in Hong Kong and China on the subject of HIV prevention and care. Programmes include attachments, visits and seminars. On 5 March, workshop participants will join our NGOs in a special seminar to promote sharing of workers of the two places.

The programme is coordinated by the Advisory Council on AIDS, while the Hospital Authority has assisted in making the domestic arrangements. The workshop is a followup to the Hong Kong AIDS Conference held in November 1996. �





YOUTH ACTION ON AIDS Funding Scheme

THE Youth Action on AIDS Funding Scheme was first lauched by the **Committee on Education** and Publicity on AIDS in 1991. Now operated by the Committee's Task Force on Youth, 84 projects have so far been supported under the Scheme involving over two hundred thousand participants. The Scheme carries the objective of promoting AIDS awareness in young people, and encouraging young people to become involved in the planning and implementation of AIDS awareness and education projects.

In 1996, a total of 15 projects have been implemented successfully under the scheme. Two categories of projects were supported - some organised by youth groups while others were under charge of youth workers in schools, outreach teams and community centres. The maximum grant awarded to a project is HK\$8000. Project operators are welcome to submit their proposal at any time of the year.



On 23 February, the Task Force on Youth organised a prize presentation ceremony cum exhibition at the newly established Red Ribbon Centre. The function was well attended by youth groups, members of the Committee on Education and Publcity and AIDS and officials of government departments. The best project awards went to Yan Oi Tong Community Centre, O Pui Shan Boys' Home, and the Tumbler



Club of School Social Work Unit of the Hong Kong Federation of Youth Groups. The Buddhist Chi Hong Chi Lam Memorial College was presented the prize for the best display of their work. Miss Ho Kim Fai, a rowing champion and chief executive of Hong Kong Sports Association for the Mentally Handicapped, was the officiating guest of the ceremony. She was accompanied by Miss Kay Ku of Hong Kong Council of Social Service, Mr Carlos Leung of Social Welfare Department, Dr S S Lee of Department of Health, and Mr Billy Ho, convenor of the Task Force on Youth.
