## The XXI Meeting

THE twenty-first meeting of the Advisory Council on AIDS was held on 11 April. The plan of reviewing the AIDS prevention, care and control programmes in Hong Kong was critically examined. Members generally considered it timely to evaluate our past and current activities with a view of working out the direction for the future, both for the Council as well as for the entire programme now contributed by the Government and the community.

The meeting also reviewed the subject of condom as a means of preventing HIV transmission, in contexts of its access and standard. Finally, the publicity and education plan for the coming year was raised and discussed. ]

### Beijing Meeting

A *Hong Kong - China AIDS meeting* will be held in Beijing from 23 to 26 of May 1997, with the participation of workers on AIDS from the two places. This is a function of a special committee co-chaired by Dr CH Leong (Hong Kong) and Dr Dai Zhi-cheng (China). Secretarial support is provided by the Hong Kong AIDS Foundation. Dr Homer Tso will be representing Advisory Council on AIDS in this coming meeting. ]

### Line of production

RED Ribbon Centre is now producing or coordinating the production of an expanding range of regular publications. These are: *AIDS Bulletin* (in Chinese) - which has become the official publication of the Centre, *Red Ribbon* (in Chinese) - a publication for people living with HIV/AIDS, *Networking Voice* of Task Force on Youth, CEPAIDS, *Hong Kong STD/AIDS Update*, and *ACA Newsfile* which you are now reading. The Centre has just released a mini-poster carrying the theme of safer sex. This is the fifth of a series on various subjects on HIV infection and AIDS for the use of community organisations. ## Sex Education

THE Education Department has published its draft Guidelines on Sex Education Schools. The Working Group on the Review of the Guidelines is inviting comments on the documents. Limited copies (4 books, bilingual) are available to members of the Council and committees at the Red Ribbon Centre. ]

## HIV/AIDS Update

THE Department of Health announced its latest reported HIV/AIDS statistics on 21 April. In the first quarter of 1997, 45 cases of HIV infection were reported, the highest number recorded so far. Of the cumulative total of 821 HIV+ individuals, 261 have already progressed to AIDS. Sexual contact has remained the single most important route of HIV transmission. Overall, the reported ratio of hetero- versus homo-sexually acquired infection is 2:1. Fifteen percents of the newly diagnosed persons are female. Of all reported AIDS cases, Pneumocystis carinii pneumonia has been and still is the commonest AIDS defining illness.

The updated statistics will be detailed in the coming

issue of *Hong Kong STD/AIDS Update* - a quarterly surveillance report published jointly by AIDS Unit and Social Hygiene Service of the Department of Health.

Reported HIV/AIDS situation is updated by AIDS Unit on a quarterly basis. ]
