
### Committee Meetings

THE Scientific Committee on AIDS will be holding its 13th meeting on 5 March. Members will be examining the minutes of an earlier meeting on HIV treatment held jointly with AIDS Services Development Committee. Other issues for deliberation are: antenatal HIV testing, STD survey, and revised principles on HIV treatment.

The Committee on Education and Publicity on AIDS met on 9 February. The meeting examined a paper reviewing the use of the media in the communication on AIDS, and another one on enhancing the future role of the Committee. The Secretariat was taking the opportunity to document various aspects of AIDS prevention/education in the last decade, and to seek the input of members in their evaluation. Such

approach would also strengthen the analytical part of the programme review now underway (see last page).

#### Youth Action on AIDS

ON 28 February, The *Youth Action on AIDS* Funding Scheme Prize Presnetation Ceremony was held at the Red Ribbon Centre.

The Ceremony was officiated by Miss HO Ka-lai, an Asian Fencing champion, Mr Gregory Leung, Deputy Secretary for Health and Welfare, Mr Carlos Leung, Assistant Director of Social Welfare, and Miss Kay Ku, Assistant Director of the Hong Kong Council of Social Service.

Since 1991, the Task Force on Youth (previously Youth Working Group) of the Committee on Education and Publicity on AIDS has been organising the programmes to support youth groups in their development of AIDS education activities for young people. So far 105 groups have received funding and technical support under the Scheme. In 1997, 21 groups were supported. The Task Force on Youth welcomes submission from youth groups.

The best project awards went to: YWCA
Tuen Mun Integrated Social Service Centre, St
Paul's Convent School, and Peer Counsellors's
Society of Haking Wong Technical Institute.

The discussion focused on the standard of treatment received by patients with HIV/AIDS in Hong Kong. The Group undertook to prepare the minutes for the meeting, which became available in February 1998. The Chairman has revised the draft minutes and is waiting for the Group's confirmation, and its agreement to release to all Members.

The first time that AIDS messages appeared in the Flower Fair was 1993, when the CEPAIDS Publicity Working Group, in association with AIDS Unit, set up a publicity stall in Victoria Pak.


Starting from the last issue of ACA Newsfile, the Secretriat has been keeping all Members updated on the progress of the review. As the Chairman has indicated, this is a project of all of us, not only that of the Government or just the Council.

#### First Consultation Meeting

THE first consultation meeting was held on 13 February. Attended by 22 persons from the major AIDS-NGOs and members of Advisory Council/committees, the meeting was the first of its kind to collect views on the review project.

Dr Conrad Lam, the chairman, introduced the objectives of the review, followed by Dr S S Lee's elaboration on the process, and Dr Teresa Choi's remarks on the questionaire survey. Dr Lam emphasised the importance of openness and independence, and the need of collecting input from the community. There was very useful exchange of views on areas of methodology, representation of the steering committee, qualitative versus quantitative analysis, and the role of PHAs (people living with HIV/AIDS).





ONE means of documenting activities of the AIDS programme is through the conduction of a questionnaire survey. The survey targets primarily service providers, but also welcomes the input of individuals and those who may not be working full time on AIDS. The deadline for returning the forms is 20 February. 🏶
