He would also deliver a keynote speech at a joint function of the Council and Hong Kong Baptist University.



Quarterly Statistics

ON 5 May, 1998, Department of Health will be releasing the reported HIV/AIDS statistics for the first quarter of 1998. The cumulative number of HIV infected has passed 1000.

HIV/AIDS surveillance is conducted by the Department of Health's AIDS Unit. It comprises a voluntary reporting system contributed by laboratories and medical practitioners, prevalence studies in selected communities and unlinked anonymous screening. The programme is supervised by the Scientific Committee of the Advisory Council on AIDS. Analysis of the quarterly information is published in Hong Kong STD/AIDS Update, a joint publication of AIDS Unit and Social Hygiene Service, Department of Health.. ₩

Reporting to the Council

AT the 25th Meeting of the Advisory Council on AIDS on 20 April, Members examined the draft Internal assessment Report compiled by the Council Secretariat. The *Report* is meant to be a briefing document to facilitate consultants in their examination of the Hong Kong programmes and situation in the second part of the Review. It was resolved that the *Report* should be made available also to members of committees/task forces as well as NGOs. The draft may be revised, subject to comments received in due course, before a final Review Report is published in the middle of the year.

Members also considered the possibility of changing the name of the Report to better reflect its nature as a situation paper. The writing of the Internal Assessment Report is supervised by a Steering Committee appointed by the Council. &



Consultation

THE third consultation meeting had been held on 28 April. This meeting was attended by two consultants -Professor John Bartlett. a renowned clinician, and Mr Nick Prescott, an economist. The meeting was participated by service providers, NGOs and interested individuals. The fourth consultation meeting (with the other two consultant) will be held a week later 🏶

DRAFT RFPORT

THE report is a 200+ page document with six chapters covering major areas of HIV/AIDS situation and programme. An Executive Summary provides an overview. The supplements gave a summary of data collected through a questionnaire survey conducted in Fenruary. The Report has been distributed to Members, asking for their comments to reach the Council Secretariat by early May. *
