BYOL





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Women & AIDS

A workshop on AIDS and women will be held on 6 June. Orgainsed by Hong Kong Federation of Women's Centres and Gender Research Programme, HKIAPS of the Chinese University of Hong Kong, the workshop will feature presentations by government official, nurse specialists and Dr Conrad Lam, Chairman of the Council.

CONSULTANCIES

THE month of May 1998 was a busy one for those involved in the review exercise. Four external consultants visited Hong Kong between 27 April and 17 May. Professor John Bartlett, an infectious disease expert and Mr Nicholas Prescott, an economist, were here in the first week, whereas Dr Clement Chan-Kam of **UNAIDS** and Dr Tim Brown of East-West Centre, Honolulu, came during the second and third week.

The four consultants had a hectic schedule in Hong Kong. A total of 31 meetings and visits were held. They had met with governmentofficials, hospital experts, academics, representatives of NGOs, Advisory Council on AIDS, Council for the AIDS Trust Fund, and people living with HIV/AIDS.

The consultants are now working on a final consultancy report which would be looking at (1)

the current HIV/AIDS situation, (2) the relevance of Hong Kong's response to that situation, (3) what is and what is not working and why, and (4) how best to adapt the response to meet Hong Kong's changing needs. Before their departure, two of the consultants (Dr Brown and Dr Chan-Kam) had met with representatives of AIDS NGOs to explain how they would be approaching the review and to share their views on the following important areas: the need for community planning, priority setting and the problem with funding.

The Steering Committee held another



meeting on 29 May, and had resolved to release the final report to all members (including committees and task forces) and NGOs once this became available. The Advisory Council on AIDS would be examining the Report at its coming meeting on 10 July. Subsequent to the meeting, the Council would consider the recommendations and discuss on how to carry them forward. As the Chairman has expressed repeatedly that "this review is going to be the beginning, not the end of the whole process of improving our local programme on HIV/AIDS prevention, care and control". ♥
