from Geneva to Hong Kong


THE World AIDS Conference in Geneva had not been featured with significant breakthroughs or enlightenment. The atmosphere was one of pragmatism and collaboration. Though it would be difficult to immediately "bridge the gap" between developed and developing countries, the consensus was that more needed to be done.

Back in Hong Kong, the gap carries a different meaning. The AIDS situation and programme review called for creatuing partnership to bridge the gap between various components of the programme - between Government and community, between research and intervention, between AIDS Trust Fund and the

overall strategy.... The title of the external consultancy report has best summarised the approach for the next phase of Hong Kong's response - moving ahead together.

Meeting postponed

THE 26th meeting of the Advisory Council on AIDS, originally scheduled for 10 July, had been postponed to 18 September. Prevention of AIDS in Asia - an update

THE Advisory Council on AIDS is the local partner of *HOPE Worldwide*'s upcoming AIDS Conference titled "Prevention of AIDS in Asia - an update". The highlights of the Conference will be a two-day state-of-art presentations on 14 and 15

November. The presentations will focus on four themes: (a) defining the problem, (b) translating medical advances into effective management, (c) patient support and care, and (d) the social and behavioural context.

There would also be field experiences in

Cambodia and China, as well as the possible organisation of satellite meetings and exhibitions by community groups. HOPE Worldwide is currently seeking the support of the Council for the AIDS Trust Fund for funding the participation of local people. Local participants are urged to send in their registration on or before 1 August for consideration of the sponsorship.



AIDS Unit maintains a voluntary reporting system contributed by clinicians and laboratories providing confirmatory HIV tests. Analysis and public release are made on a quarterly basis.

THE final consultancy report had been presented by Dr Tim Brown at a special briefing session held by the Advisory Council on AIDS on 10 July. The document has also been sent to all members of the Council, the three committees, task forces and NGOs.



A special working group was subsequently set up to examine how to respond to the report and to carry forward recommendations contained therein. The Group, comprising chairmen of the committees and the Council chairman, has met in July and would be

reporting to the Advisory
Council on AIDS at its next
meeting. The Chairman has
repeatedly remarked that
the 'review' was not the end
but the beginning of a
whole process of
programme improvement.
New plans will be
developed in the second
half of the year.
