AIDS Prevention in Asia - an update



Committee News

New API

THE Task Force on Media and Publicity of the Committee on Education and Publicity on AIDS met on 29 October to discuss on the launching of a new API (announcement of public interest) focussing on condom use. The new TV spot will feature a television celebrity, and members are pleased with the progress so far.

Funding Scheme in Action

THE 1998 Youth Funding Scheme on AIDS has so far supported 24 projects on AIDS education activities targeting young people. Under this scheme, youth workers and youth groups are encouraged to propose innovative projects to arouse young people's awareness towards AIDS prevention and care. Each project, if supported, receives not more than HK\$8000 to implement the plan.



The scheme is operated by the Task Force on Youth of the Committee on Education and Publicity on AIDS. Technical support is provided via the Red Ribbon Centre.

New Force

Convened by Dr Joseph Lau, CEPAIDS's new Task Force on Travellers (TFT) has a membership list including Mr. Billy Ho, Mr Tony Pang, Ms Bella Luk, Ms OC Lin, Sr Ann Grey, Ms Elijah Fung and new faces like Ms Paulina Kwok of Caritas and Ms Linda Wong of Federation of Women's Service Centre.

The Task Force's focus will be on travellers going to mainland China and Macau, and their regular partners that may be affected. Prevention work on travellers has been identified* as one of the priority areas requiring focused efforts for prevention.

THE Department of Health released its quarterly reported HIV/ AIDS statistics on 29 October. A total of 32 new cases of HIV

infection and 10 AIDS have been reported between July and September 1998. Breakdown of the cumulative data is tabulated below. More detailed analysis will be provided in the publication *Hong Kong STD/AIDS Update*, a joint publication of Special Preventive Programme and Social Hygiene Service of Department of Health. ACA NEWSFILE

A Conference hosted by China AIDS Network and Hong Kong AIDS Foundation was held in Dalian from 1-3 October. Dr Joseph Lau has kindly provided us the following report.

THIRTY-three members of China AIDS Network (CAN) from 19 provinces met in Dalian with representatives from 5 NGOs of Hong Kong to share experience in last year's work on AIDS.

The Conference was a continuation of a previous one in Hangzhou, with the participation of experts in surveillance, behaviouralintervention and research.

Issues discussed included the setting up of behaviouralsurveillance systems, methodological issues in risk behaviour survey, management of people living with HIV/ AIDS (PLWA) in a prison setting, cultural factors affecting AIDS campaigns, evaluation of AIDS hotline service, affectionate sharing of counselling experience, attitudes and behaviours of commercial sex workers (CSWs) in some detention centres, and need for youth intervention programmes in China.

One important presentation was that of

the HIV situation in Xinjiang, describing the highest HIV rate in injection drug users. Workers there are facing heavy resource constraints, reminding us of our relatively better support we have in Hong Kong.



While the formal presentations form the key parts of the conference, the informal parts are clearly of equal importance, for purpose of networking. After years of exchanges, participants have become friends in a 'real' sense. We were able to speak our minds, give critical views of each other's work and provide mutual support to one another. There were discussions on possible clinical trials on Chinese medicine, costeffectiveness analysis and quality of life (QOL) studies...



The Conference has been a very enjoyable experience. Our collaboration with our 'Tung Dao' (people on the same road) in China has been growing and its importance is obvious as AIDS is not a geographicallyisolated problem. Conferences like this is one of the key meeting places for exchange of experience and ideas. Hong Kong's involvement in the Chinese network has also deepened.

At the Conference, Dr. CH Leong was elected the vice-president of CAN, while O C Lin of Hong Kong AIDS Foundation and myself are now serving as two of the secretaries of the Network. We are looking forward to similar events of better quality and wider participation in the future, of course, with the presence of all who are interested.
